3. Campus Pastors Report

Cornwall

We've had another amazing year in Lifecentre Cornwall! Six years as Lifecentre Cornwall and four years for us pastoring here! God has been so faithful to us this year! I think back to the 50-70 people who would register for church each week when we arrived to the minimum 275 people we directly minister to every week through the church and Mobile Mission!

Last year, we had three main goals:

a. Deepen the Vision: We saw people gravitate to who we are as a church, not only in the hearts of the core but also in the larger body!

b. Deepen our Discipleship: We saw 25 people go through LifeTrack, 28 salvations and 14 get baptized! We saw an average of 40 people at our discipleship nights and 31 attending 5 LifeGroups!

c. Deepen the Benches: Last year, we ended with 65 people who volunteered regularly; this year, 104 people serve regularly in some capacity! 43% of those serve our community on behalf of the church!

Our overarching direction of Becoming HeartStrong has tied well into where we, as a church family, needed to go. It has been amazing to see the growth and healing in people's lives. Families integrate, allowing discipleship and mentoring to get there! A mother's consistent prayer led to all three of her children being baptized! People are free of addiction, attending all our discipleship nights, and serving. Their lifestyle dramatically changed to honour God! Those pouring into a tent city meet their physical needs with the help of Lifecentre Care as they also look to meet spiritual needs!

We have beautifully seen God do healing work in people who have experienced painful hurt at the hands of the church. We knew it would take God's healing touch to help so many who were hurting, and he has been faithful! His touch has led to so much transformation!

This doesn't even touch the fact that we were blessed to be able to bring on Matrix in a similar relationship as City Serve! It has been a Godsend in terms of growing our ability to meet the needs of the community and be a larger contributor to Lifecentre Care as we're able to bless both campuses and the Food Bank!

Our partnership with Lifecentre Care has also allowed us to minister to the community exponentially! We are able to help seven different churches in the area, as well as a number of Non-Faith-Based groups with centres across the Seaway region.

Our prayer team sensed God would give to us in abundance so we could pour out of it —they were not wrong! This was a precursor to the growth God would send...



We could go on; we truly have so much to be thankful for. We thank Pastor Jason and Lori for their encouragement and faith-building leadership during this season of growth.

We thank the Pastor's Council for your guidance, support, and prayers. We also thank Johanne Choquette for being such a pillar in our local campus community, a leader in loving gracefully, and for representing us so well on the Pastor's Council.

Looking ahead, the time is right for more than deepening. Deepening is always a part of what we do; now is the time for us to empower and engage.

With the influx of new and younger church members who are now ready to take on a deeper purpose, we want to:

1. Empower Outreach With Vision: We want to see more Mobile Mission leaders bring the truck to more locations on different evenings. We want to see our Lifecentre Care Team own the warehouse and work with partners in the community.

2. Empower Teams With Vision: We will look to diversify the leadership of areas, having more people carrying the weight of the vision.

3. Engage Community For Growth: In faith, we want to engage the community for growth, leading to a second service. We are putting out another jar, as it were, to see God fill it. God has filled every jar we have put out so far, and we believe He will fill this one as well!

As Pastor Ingrid and I have led in Cornwall, our vision has been about revival:

"To seek revival in our city, we know that as a campus we start with personal rootedness in Christ. We deepen our roots to widen our reach." To seek revival in our city, we know that as a campus we need to disciple our new generation of believers to stand firm in their faith. To seek revival in the city, we know that as a campus rooted in Christ and disciplining believers, we need to empower them to engage in our church and community. We will see revival as we obey Christ in all things!

Everything we need to empower and engage is in the house; what comes next is the harvest! Recently, one of our prayer team members shared a vision they saw: large numbers of people coming to the altar in Cornwall! We are receiving that word! Standing, trusting and humbly walking in Him. This leads us to highlight some of the things we look forward to at the Kanata Campus in the coming year.

This year, we are committed to creating deeper and more meaningful moments of community building. Our Young Adults have made massive steps in the past season, and we believe LifeGroups, connection points, and community will take root within this age group. This year, we want to see meaningful discipleship take place, and we will increase the care and interactions that the congregation has with each other.

On that note, we will launch a brand new Hospitality Team that will be active each Sunday morning and provide care opportunities throughout the week. We know that God has increased this campus, but we want to see these roots grow deep, not just wide.

Financial Statements for 2022-2023

Pastor Gabe Gratton provided a summary of the financial statements with points of significance. Generous giving has increased offerings by 12%. There has been a significant increase in all activities, notably the youth, post Covid-pandemic. Renovations were undertaken in all Campuses, notably the Blackburn foodbank. We continue to provide 10% to Life Missions outreach. As per the recommendation of our auditors, we have restricted funds for a future downtown Campus, emergencies, and 3-months of expenses. The mortgage for Blackburn Campus has been paid and we are working toward a mortgage-free situation in Kanata as well. Although we have separate Campus for the purpose of decisions and financial operations we are a single entity. One question from Robert Craig on building expenses.

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Independent Auditor's Report

To the members of The Life Centre Christian Fellowship

Qualified Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of The Life Centre Christian Fellowship (the "Centre"), which comprise the statement of financial position as at June 30, 2024, and the statements of changes in net assets, operations and cash flows for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, except for the possible effects of the matter described in the *Basis for Qualified Opinion* section of our report, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of The Life Centre Christian Fellowship as at June 30, 2024, and its results of operations and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

In common with many not-for-profit organizations, the Centre derives revenue from donations, the completeness of which is not susceptible to satisfactory audit verification. Accordingly, verification of these revenues was limited to the amounts recorded in the records of the Centre. Therefore, we were not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to Sunday weekend services, designated income and various activities, excess of revenues over expenses, and cash flows from operations for the years ended June 30, 2024 and 2023, current assets as at June 30, 2024 and 2023, and net assets as at July 1, 2023 and 2022 and June 30, 2024 and 2023. Our audit opinion on the financial statements for the year ended June 30, 2023 was modified accordingly because of the possible effects of this limitation in scope.

We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements* section of our report. We are independent of the Centre in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in Canada, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our qualified audit opinion.

Other Matter - Supplementary Information

We draw attention to the fact that the supplementary information included in Schedules 1, 2 and 3 does not form part of these financial statements. We have not audited or reviewed this supplementary information and, accordingly, we do not express an opinion, a review conclusion or any other form of assurance on this supplementary information.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Centre's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Centre or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Centre's financial reporting process.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also:

• Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.



- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Centre's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Centre's ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Centre to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

We communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.

1. Accounting Policies

Purpose of Organization	The Life Centre Christian Fellowship (the "Centre") is a not-for-
	profit organization incorporated without share capital under the
	Canada Not-for-profit Corporations Act. They are a member of
	The Pentecostal Assemblies of Canada. The Centre's priorities of
	mission are the establishing of this local church as well as
	supporting ministries in the National Capital Region, throughout
	Canada and abroad. The Centre is a registered charity and, as
	such, is exempt from income taxes and may issue income tax
	receipts to donors.

- **Basis of Accounting** The Centre applies the Canadian accounting standards for not-forprofit organizations.
- Presentation of the
Controlled
OrganizationLifecentre Foodbank, which is controlled by the Centre, is not
consolidated in these financial statements. Information regarding
Lifecentre Foodbank is presented in note 9.
- Use of Estimates The preparation of financial statements requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses for the year covered. The main estimates relate to the estimated useful lives of tangible capital assets and pension obligation.
- **Revenue Recognition** The Centre follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions. Restricted contributions, including designated income and grants, are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred, which may result in deferred contributions. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

Rental income is recognized on a monthly basis in accordance with the various rental agreements and when collection is reasonably assured.

Inventory Inventory, consisting entirely of goods for resale, is valued at the lower of cost and net realizable value. The cost is determined on a first-in, first-out basis.

1. Accounting Policies (continued)

Financial Instruments Arm's length financial instruments are recorded at fair value at initial recognition. Related party financial instruments are recorded at cost at initial recognition.

In subsequent periods, financial instruments are reported at amortized cost less impairment. Transaction costs on the acquisition, sale or issue of financial instruments are charged to the financial instrument for those measured at amortized cost.

Financial assets are tested for impairment when indicators of impairment exist. When a significant change in the expected timing or amount of the future cash flows of the financial asset is identified, the carrying amount of the financial asset is reduced and the amount of the write-down is recognized in net income. A previously recognized impairment loss may be reversed to the extent of the improvement, provided it is not greater than the amount that would have been reported at the date of the reversal had the impairment not been recognized previously, and the amount of the reversal is recognized in net income.

Tangible Capital AssetsTangible capital assets are stated at cost less accumulated
amortization. Contributed tangible capital assets are recorded at
fair value at the date of contribution. Amortization is provided on
the basis of their useful lives using the following method and
annual rates:

Buildings	2% straight-line basis
Equipment and furniture	10% straight-line basis
Computer equipment	20% straight-line basis
Parking lot	8% straight-line basis

- Impairment of Long-LivedLong-lived assets are tested for recoverability whenever events or
changes in circumstances indicate that their carrying amount may
not be recoverable. An impairment loss is recognized when their
carrying value exceeds the total undiscounted cash flows
expected from their use and eventual disposition. The amount of
the impairment loss is determined as the excess of the carrying
value of the asset over its fair value.
- **Contributed Services** The Centre would not be able to carry out its activities without the services of the many volunteers who donate a considerable number of hours. Because of the difficulty of compiling these hours, contributed services are not recognized in the financial statements.

Contributed Materials	Contributed materials which are used in the normal course of The Centre's operations and would otherwise have been purchased are recorded at their fair value at the date of contribution.
Deferred Contributions Related to Tangible Capital Assets	Contributions relating to tangible capital assets are accounted for as deferred contributions and amortized on the same basis as the related tangible capital assets.
Employee Future Benefits	The Centre has a defined benefit pension plan. The defined benefit obligation is determined using an accounting valuation prepared for funding purposes. The total cost of the defined benefit plan for the period is comprised of the current service cost, finance cost, and remeasurements and other items. Each of these components are charged to operations for the period.

Subsequent to year-end, in September 2024, the mortgage was fully repaid.

Total interest on long-term debt paid during the year was \$13,512 (2023 - \$22,061).

7. Pension Obligation

As part of the acquisition of At Thy Word Ministries Inc. on September 1, 2018, the Centre acquired a pension obligation. The Centre committed to a monthly stipend in postemployment benefits to the Pastor Emeritus for the duration of her life. The Centre administers the contributory defined benefit pension plan. Based on the latest accounting valuation of the Plan, on a going concern basis as of June 30, 2024, the pension obligation is \$196,000, of which \$24,000 is reported as current.

As part of the acquisition of LifecentreCORNWALL in September 2018, the Centre agreed that the Church manse in Cornwall would remain the Pastor Emeritus' home for the remainder of her years unless she chooses to move. No consideration has been received.

8. Interfund Transfers and Internal Restrictions

The Centre's internally restricted resources are restricted for future Church planting, improvements and furnishings, fixtures and information technology upgrades and future mortgage payments. The balance in the internally restricted fund as at June 30, 2024 is \$500,000 (2023 - \$500,000). The Council also restricted net assets invested in tangible capital assets for an amount of \$3,919,550. These internally restricted amounts are not available for any other purpose without approval of the Council.

9. Controlled Organization

Lifecentre Foodbank is controlled by the Centre since the management of the organization is closely involved in developing the policies of Lifecentre Foodbank and can influence their content. Lifecentre Foodbank, which was created to provide food to those in need, is incorporated under the Canadian Not-for-profit Corporations Act. As a registered charity within the meaning of the Income Tax Act, it may issue receipts for charitable donations.

10. Land Lease and Taxes

The lease for the property on which LifecentreORLEANS is located is registered in the name of the Centre. The lease is for a term of 52 years beginning in 1992, from the National Capital Commission. The Centre pays an approximate annual amount of \$3,000 towards land lease and taxes.

11. Financial Instruments

Credit risk

The Centre is exposed to credit risk arising from all of its bank accounts being held at one financial institution and deposits are only insured up to \$100,000.

Interest rate risk

The Centre is exposed to interest rate risk arising from the possibility that changes in interest rates will affect the fair value of fixed income investment and long-term debt.

There were no changes to these risks during the year.
