Yes to both questions and for Isreal the funding is provided to a non-for-profit called Firm.

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Independent Auditor's Report

To the members of The Life Centre Christian Fellowship

Qualified Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of The Life Centre Christian Fellowship (the "Centre"), which comprise the statement of financial position as at June 30, 2025, and the statements of changes in net assets, operations and cash flows for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, except for the possible effects of the matter described in the *Basis for Qualified Opinion* section of our report, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of The Life Centre Christian Fellowship as at June 30, 2025, and its results of operations and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

In common with many not-for-profit organizations, the Centre derives revenue from donations, the completeness of which is not susceptible to satisfactory audit verification. Accordingly, verification of these revenues was limited to the amounts recorded in the records of the Centre. Therefore, we were not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to Sunday weekend services, designated income and various activities, excess of revenues over expenses, and cash flows from operations for the years ended June 30, 2025 and 2024, current assets as at June 30, 2025 and 2024, and net assets as at July 1, 2024 and 2023 and June 30, 2025 and 2024. Our audit opinion on the financial statements for the year ended June 30, 2024 was modified accordingly because of the possible effects of this limitation in scope.

We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities* for the *Audit of the Financial Statements* section of our report. We are independent of the Centre in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in Canada, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our qualified audit opinion.



Other Matter - Supplementary Information

We draw attention to the fact that the supplementary information included in Schedules 1, 2 and 3 does not form part of these financial statements. We have not audited or reviewed this supplementary information and, accordingly, we do not express an opinion, a review conclusion or any other form of assurance on this supplementary information.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Centre's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Centre or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Centre's financial reporting process.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also:

• Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.



- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Centre's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Centre's ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Centre to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

We communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.

1. Accounting Policies

Purpose of Organization The Life

The Life Centre Christian Fellowship (the "Centre") is a not-for-profit organization incorporated without share capital under the Canada Not-for-profit Corporations Act. They are a member of The Pentecostal Assemblies of Canada. The Centre's priorities of mission are the establishing of this local church as well as supporting ministries in the National Capital Region, throughout Canada and abroad. The Centre is a registered charity and, as such, is exempt from income taxes and may issue income tax receipts to donors.

Basis of Accounting

The Centre applies the Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses for the year covered. The main estimates relate to the estimated useful lives of tangible capital assets and pension obligation.

Revenue Recognition

The Centre follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions. Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred, which may result in deferred contributions. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

Rental income is recognized on a monthly basis in accordance with the various rental agreements and when collection is reasonably assured.

Inventory

Inventory, consisting entirely of goods for resale, is valued at the lower of cost and net realizable value. The cost is determined on a first-in, first-out basis.

1. Accounting Policies (continued)

Financial Instruments

Arm's length financial instruments are recorded at fair value at initial recognition. Related party financial instruments are recorded at cost at initial recognition.

In subsequent periods, financial instruments are reported at cost or amortized cost less impairment. Transaction costs on the acquisition, sale or issue of financial instruments are expensed for those items measured at fair value and charged to the financial instrument for those measured at amortized cost.

Financial assets are tested for impairment when indicators of impairment exist. When a significant change in the expected timing or amount of the future cash flows of the financial asset is identified, the carrying amount of the financial asset is reduced and the amount of the write-down is recognized in net income. A previously recognized impairment loss may be reversed to the extent of the improvement, provided it is not greater than the amount that would have been reported at the date of the reversal had the impairment not been recognized previously, and the amount of the reversal is recognized in net income.

Tangible Capital Assets

Tangible capital assets are stated at cost less accumulated amortization. Contributed tangible capital assets are recorded at fair value at the date of contribution. Amortization is provided on the basis of their useful lives using the following method and annual rates:

Buildings	2% straight-line basis
Equipment and furniture	10% straight-line basis
Computer equipment	20% straight-line basis
Parking lot	8% straight-line basis

Assets

Impairment of Long-Lived Long-lived assets are tested for recoverability whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that their carrying amount may not be recoverable. An impairment loss is recognized when their carrying value exceeds the total undiscounted cash flows expected from their use and eventual disposition. The amount of the impairment loss is determined as the excess of the carrying value of the asset over its fair value.

Contributed Services

The Centre would not be able to carry out its activities without the services of the many volunteers who donate a considerable number of hours. Because of the difficulty of compiling these hours, contributed services are not recognized in the financial statements.

Total interest on long-term debt paid during the year was \$3,228 (2024 - \$13,510).

7. Pension Obligation

As part of the acquisition of LifecentreCORNWALL (formerly At Thy Word Ministries Inc.), on September 1, 2018, the Centre acquired a pension obligation. The Centre committed to a monthly stipend in post-employment benefits to the Pastor Emeritus for the duration of her life. The Centre administers the contributory defined benefit pension plan. Based on the latest accounting valuation of the Plan, on a going concern basis as of June 30, 2025, the pension obligation is \$172,000, of which \$24,000 is reported as current.

As part of the acquisition of LifecentreCORNWALL in September 2018, the Centre agreed that the Church manse in Cornwall would remain the Pastor Emeritus' home for the remainder of her years unless she chooses to move. No consideration has been received.

8. Interfund Transfers and Internal Restrictions

The Centre's internally restricted resources are restricted for future Church planting, improvements and furnishings, fixtures and information technology upgrades. The balance in the internally restricted fund as at June 30, 2025 is \$500,000 (2024 - \$500,000). The Council also restricted net assets invested in tangible capital assets for an amount of \$4,405,589. These internally restricted amounts are not available for any other purpose without approval of the Council.

9. Significantly Influenced Not-for-Profit Organization

The Centre exercises significant influence over Lifecentre Foodbank since there is an intercharge of managerial personnel. Lifecentre Foodbank, which was created to provide food to those in need, is incorporated under the Canadian Not-for-profit Corporations Act. As a registered charity within the meaning of the Income Tax Act, it may issue receipts for charitable donations.

10. Land Lease and Taxes

The lease for the property on which LifecentreORLEANS is located is registered in the name of the Centre. The lease is for a term of 52 years beginning in 1992, from the National Capital Commission. The Centre pays an approximate annual amount of \$3,000 towards land lease and taxes.

11. Financial Instruments

Credit risk

The Centre is exposed to credit risk arising from all of its bank accounts being held at one financial institution and deposits are only insured up to \$100,000. There were no changes in this risk during the year.

Interest rate risk

The Centre is exposed to interest rate risk arising from the possibility that changes in interest rates will affect the fair value of fixed income investment and long-term debt. This risk has decreased during the year since all long-term debt was repaid.

12. Comparative Amounts

For comparison purposes, certain items of the previous year have been restated to reflect the financial statement presentation adopted in the current year.
